#### DIRECTOR'S NOTE

I have always loved Charlie Brown, Lucy, Snoopy and the rest of the gang. As a kid, I would spend hours reading the paperback collections of "Peanuts" comics that my Mom would get me for my birthday each year. As I grew older, I continued to read the strip in the daily paper. I was always amused and impressed at how skillfully Charles M. Schulz could incorporate humor, hope, wisdom, and an adult sensibility to a cartoon about a group of children. The integrity of the material has never wavered. It remains a timeless and loving look at the human condition in its simplest form.

I have been acting and appearing on stage since the age of six. After more than 60 amateur and professional theatrical productions, I decided I wanted to try my hand at directing (isn't that what all actors eventually say?). In 2004, *You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown* became the second show I ever directed, and it was a truly joyous experience! The cast and crew of that production became a family.

To this day, many of my closest and most trusted friends and theatre collaborators are people I met while working on that show. That we all had such a good time and became such great friends isn't that surprising. Just look at the source material -- it's all in there.

When Kris Bell (Choreographer) and Pat King (Musical Director) contacted me to ask if I had any interest in working with them on a new production, I said yes immediately. For me, this is a gem of a show. It is suitable for the entire family, yet it offers something different to each person who sees it. For the younger audience, it is a lively and amusing tale of the day to day foibles of our hero, our "every man", Charlie Brown. For the more "seasoned" audience, it is an uncomplicated look at friendship, loyalty and love told from the perspective of children, yet not childishly told.

Because of its origin as a comic strip, You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown has come to be regarded by some as a "kids show". Most productions are aimed at or performed by younger actors and high school drama departments. We believe that there is much more to it, just as there was so much more to the "Peanuts" strip. We see the value and universal appeal in the material and appreciate the opportunity to present our vision for Actors Ensemble.

This show is our gift to you, the audience; we hope it is one that speaks to the hearts and minds of everyone who sees it. We believe this is the gift that Charles Schulz gave to the world when he created "Peanuts". Further, since this production honors Ralph Miller, a man who lovingly gave the gift of his time and talents to Actors Ensemble for many wonderful years, this seems a fitting approach.


